## MORGANS FOR CHINA

For over a year a Committee of Chinese Officers have been visiting stud farms and experimental stations in the United States, studying our methods of livestock production. They were particularly preoccupied with the problem of determining what American breeds might be taken to China that would best be suited to improving the native Chinese horses.

The group consisted of Major General S. S. Young, Major General P. C. Tsui and Lieutenant Colonel W. Y. Chang.,

We are happy to have the opportunity to publish the following letter from Major General Tsui in regard to their purchases. All Morgan breeders will wish General Tsui and his associates a comfortable voyage home and the best of good fortune in the use of these Morgans for improving the horses of China.

Dear Mr. Hills:

Thank you very much for your nice letter which came to me on August 7. I am so glad to tell you about my story of purchasing horses for the Chinese government in the United States and to know that you will have this published in the Morgan Horse Magazine.

First of all I want to express my heartful appreciation to you and all my friends who have taken care of us in everything during our traveling period. I want also to apologize to those members of the Morgan Horse Club whom I have not got a chance to visit.

I was not so interested in Morgan horses before I met Dr. R. W. Phillips in 1942 in China who suggested us to try the Morgan horse for improving the Chinese native breed. Being introduced by you and Dr. R. W. Phillips, Mr. E. B. Krantz, Mrs. Melvina M. Morse, and Miss Marylin O. Carlson I have become acquainted with many breeders in the United States. Some of these breeders did let me have some of their favorite horses thus enabling me to get a total of twelve stallions and fourteen mares.

I am so proud that I did get a chance to visit the U. S. Morgan Horse Farm, Green Mountain Stock Farm, and Upwey Farm in Vermont; El Rancho poco, Robert's Morgan Horse Farm, Hearst's Ranch, Mountain Spring Ranch, and El Captain Rancho in California; Brunk Bros. Horse Farm, and Oneill Bros. Horse Farm in Illinois; L. U. Sheep Company in Wyoming; and Gustason's Farm in Iowa. Unfortunately time does not permit me to visit all the breeders in New England and other states. I shall go to visit Mr. Roland G. Hill in Tres Pinos, California, if time permits before I leave.

Regarding the horses which I got from the United States I would like to say frankly that some of them made me satisfied by their famous petigree and/or good conformation.

That the Morgan horse can accommodate themselves to

the various circumstances, possessing fixed inheritable qualities, gentle disposition, good conformation etc. made me satisfied and suited for improving the Chinese native horses.

The Morgan horses have flourished in the United States for about 150 years. For the old and new type of Morgan horse I would like to say that each type has its own specific characteristic. As we love them and they can accomplish their responsibilities we will say that they are good horses. Just like one made her or his mate, no matter he or she is short or tall so long as they love each other and treat each other with equality and faithfulness they will be good partners.


We have got both old and new type of Morgan horses for the Chinese mares. Those new type stallions will be distributed to the Northwestern part of China where the native mares have comparatively large size and those of the old type stallions will be distributed to the mountain district in Southwestern part of China. I wish that the Morgan breed not only perpetuate in the United States but will also be flourished in the whole world and that they will make a big contribution to the improvement of the Chinese native horses so as to get a good reputation for their owner, especially for their ancestor—Justin Morgan—in order that the statue of Justin Morgan will be found in China. The names of the Morgan horses who are going to China will be listed on the enclosed sheet.

At present time we got only a few Quarterbred and thoroughbred from the other famous breeds.


